I. PURPOSE

To highlight your Administration's commitment to improving the Federal effort to fight cancer, and to raise public awareness of the need for preventive cancer screenings as outlined in your *HealthierUS* agenda.

II. BACKGROUND

You have committed your Administration to fight cancer through a comprehensive agenda that improves the prevention, diagnosis, and treatment of the disease. As part of your commitment to double the budget for the National Institutes of Health (NIH), your 2003 budget increases funding for cancer research by \$629 million for a total \$5.5 billion investment in cancer research throughout the NIH. Because of the increased collaboration with other Federal agencies and the private sector, the NIH is increasing the speed of the translation of research breakthroughs into new therapies for patients.

Scientific evidence shows that the chances of surviving and recovering from cancer are improved if the disease is detected early. There is also growing evidence that improvements in physical activity, nutrition, and personal behavior can reduce the incidence of cancer in America. In fact, this summer you challenged Americans to take better care of themselves in your *HealthierUS* initiative, and you highlighted measures individuals could take to prevent illness, including diseases such as cancer.

In May of this year, you appointed Lance Armstrong to the President's Cancer Panel, a three-member group that advises the Administration on progress in the war against cancer. Mr. Armstrong has formed a nonprofit organization called the Lance Armstrong Foundation to promote cancer survivorship issues, including making treatments less severe or invasive and improving the quality of life for cancer survivors. However, recently introduced legislation supported by the Foundation could limit the ability of NCI to establish research priorities because it mandates a specific percentage of the NIH's budget be dedicated to survivorship research; and it also could adversely affect the privacy of cancer patients. While not specifically endorsing this legislation, you will recognize the growing population of cancer survivors in the United States, and highlight the ongoing work at the National Cancer Institute to better understand the needs of cancer survivors.

The audience for your remarks consists of leading members of the cancer research and advocacy community, as well as a group of cancer survivors.

III. PARTICIPANTS

Paige Brown – Chronic myelogenous leukemia survivor in her early 30s. She produces a news program in Tennessee called “Talk of the Town” and serves as a national spokesperson to raise awareness and inspire others with her disease.

Patricia A. Goldman – Retired airline executive and former government appointee, she currently serves as the President of the Ovarian Cancer National Alliance, an educational and advocacy organization based in Washington, D.C., that unites ovarian cancer survivors, advocates, and healthcare professionals in the fight to overcome ovarian cancer. Patricia was diagnosed with ovarian cancer in 1993.

Jamal Rasheed – 48-year-old prostate cancer survivor from Dallas. Serves as a health education consultant to the Dallas Public School system and teaches children about physical fitness and drug and alcohol awareness. Mr. Rasheed founded the Alternative Education Athletic Association of Texas, giving at-risk inner-city children a safe place to learn and play sports.

Cynthia Rubin - Diagnosed at the age of 36 with Stage III breast cancer, Cynthia serves as President of the Young Survival Coalition. She is featured in the Lifetime TV documentary *Fighting for Our Future*, about young women and breast cancer, that will air on October 10, 2002, as well as a companion book. She is a partner at Flemming, Zulack & Williamson, LLP in New York City specializing in Family and Matrimonial Law.

Matthew Skowronski – 13-year-old acute lymphoblastic leukemia survivor from Purcellville, Virginia. Matt is an active participant in the Leukemia and Lymphoma Society’s Team In Training program, which helps to raise money for leukemia and lymphoma research.

The fight against cancer has seen major victories – and is on the verge of major breakthroughs. Medical science is helping cancer victims survive – and helping survivors lead better lives. With exercise, nutrition, and changed behavior, we can reduce the chances of developing cancer. And with well-funded research, we are pushing toward new cancer therapies and new cancer cures. The commitment of our Nation is clear: We will win the fight against cancer.

Our progress against cancer is dramatic, and continuing. We know that focused and sustained efforts can make a difference, because we have seen survival rates rise. Lance Armstrong's inspiring career is striking proof that testicular cancer survivors can go on to lead lives of extraordinary accomplishment. Thanks to advances in science, five-year survival rates for testicular cancer have reached an amazing ninety-five percent.

Overall, more than sixty percent of the Americans diagnosed with cancer today can expect to be alive in five years. The survival rate for children after ten years is approaching seventy percent. Today, 8.9 million Americans are cancer survivors, and research and new technology offer hope that this number will continue to grow significantly. Every life ... every name ... is a triumph of medicine, and a triumph of hope.

Given the statistics, the good news about cancer survivors also presents a challenge. Cancer survivors need high quality follow-up care to detect early signs of recurrence, and to treat other problems that come from the illness and its treatment. For example, many childhood cancer survivors do not receive any follow-up care after being treated and cured. Because cancer treatments can harm growing tissues, children are particularly vulnerable to recurrences and complications. The National Cancer Institute is committed to improving the long-term care for all cancer survivors, and especially for children. NCI-funded scientists are exploring new ways to enhance high quality follow-up care for these children.

We also must accelerate our progress against cancer itself. Despite all our gains, the disease continues to take a terrible toll on our country. More than 1,500 Americans die from cancer every day; three out of every four American families will have at least one family member diagnosed with cancer.

Scientists, healthcare providers, and public health professionals are working tirelessly to find cures for this disease – and they need our full support. My 2003 budget would increase funding for cancer research by 629 million dollars, for a total investment in cancer research throughout the National Institutes of Health of more than five billion dollars.

Prevention is critical – and we are just beginning to make progress on cancer prevention. There are smart choices all Americans can make to reduce our chances of disease – choices we are promoting in our HealthierUS [rhymes with bus] Initiative. Even modest improvements in diet, fitness, and behavior can help prevent many serious health problems, including cancer. There is a growing body of evidence that a diet rich in fruits and vegetables reduces the risk of cancer and other chronic diseases. In fact, it has been estimated that dietary changes could reduce cancer deaths in the United States by one-third.

Regular exercise is another way to prevent illness and add years to your life. Last June, I signed an Executive Order directing federal agencies to work together to develop new policies to promote fitness. And I reconstituted the President's Council on Physical Fitness and Sports, and appointed Lynn Swann, a good friend and football legend, to chair the Council. Exercise is an important part of my life, and I urge all Americans to make it an important part of your own lives.

And of course when it comes to behavior there are healthy choices we can all make – like to quit smoking or better yet, never to start.

In addition to a nutritious diet, regular exercise and smart choices, preventive health screenings can also help save lives. They can detect many forms of cancer at earlier, less dangerous stages, allowing doctors to defeat a cancer before it spreads.

Last month, my Secretary of Agriculture, Ann Veneman, learned that she has breast cancer. This is one of the hardest things a woman can hear from her doctor, and one of the toughest challenges to a family. Fortunately, Secretary Veneman's cancer was diagnosed at a very early and curable stage, and her doctors expect her to enjoy a full recovery following treatment. She also told me that she fully expects to carry out the responsibilities of her position during her treatment.

I am honored to have Secretary Veneman on my team ... and I have never been prouder of her than I am today. And I want the Secretary and her family to know that they are not alone. Here at the White House, Laura and I, and all of Secretary Veneman's many friends and colleagues, are praying for her complete recovery. And many other Americans are wishing her well, and remembering the Secretary in their prayers.

Secretary Veneman told me that her cancer could not have been detected without a mammogram – and she stressed the importance of regular check-ups. Yet today, thirty percent of American women are still not receiving mammograms. And late diagnosis is also one reason why colorectal cancer is the second leading cause of cancer-related deaths for Americans. Earlier this year I made sure to get screened for colorectal cancer. But we still have much work to do to make people aware of the tremendous, life-saving value of cancer screenings.

While we work to make Americans aware of screenings, scientists are actively investigating new ways of making screenings better and detecting cancer earlier. For example, the National Cancer Institute is launching a new clinical trial to study the most effective way to detect lung cancer.

Scientists have also developed a promising new test that analyzes a single drop of blood to detect ovarian cancer in its earliest stages, even before symptoms develop. Many women are diagnosed with ovarian cancer too late because its symptoms can easily be mistaken for other conditions, such as cysts and other forms of cancer. This new discovery brings great hope for overcoming this disease.

There are still many high medical hurdles that need to be cleared ... but for the first time in human history, we can say that the war on cancer is winnable. And this Nation will not quit until our victory against cancer is complete.

And now, it is my great pleasure to introduce a man who does not know the meaning of the word "quit." Just a few years ago, he was diagnosed with cancer. He was weakened by chemotherapy treatments and told he had a 50/50 chance of surviving. But he has done more than survive ... he has triumphed. His story – from cancer diagnosis to his fourth straight victory in the Tour de France – is one of the great human dramas in the history of sports. Today, he is celebrating his 31st birthday.

Ladies and gentlemen, it is my great honor to present to you a son of Texas, a great American champion, and an extraordinary human being: Lance Armstrong.

I. PURPOSE

To meet with the Presidential Board of Advisors for Historically Black Colleges and Universities (HBCU) and to listen to recommendations for advancing these institutions.

II. BACKGROUND

You signed a proclamation recognizing September 15-21, 2002, as National Historically Black Colleges and University Week. The Presidential Board of Advisors for HBCUs will attend the Department of Education and the White House HBCU Initiative's annual conference this week in Washington, D.C.

On February 12, 2002, you signed Executive Order 13256, further strengthening the ability of HBCUs to provide an excellent education to young people throughout America. The Executive Order calls upon the Presidential Board of Advisors for HBCUs to submit an annual report on the state of HBCUs and recommend ways to advance HBCUs in areas such as academic performance, use of technology, and financial planning and development.

Your Executive Order requires the following new mandates: (i) ensuring that all board members are HBCU presidents or private sector representatives; (ii) transferring the HBCU White House Initiative from the Office of Post-Secondary Education to the Office of the Secretary of Education; and (iii) increasing the call for HBCU private-sector partnerships.

The HBCU Board met twice this year and identified three priorities for HBCU institutions. The priorities include: (i) accreditation and increased accountability for HBCUs that are facing difficulties in leadership and institutional management, including student financial aid; (ii) increased support from the 30 Federal agencies that are mandated under the terms of the Executive Order to support HBCUs; and (iii) increased private-sector partnerships with HBCUs.

HBCUs enroll 14 percent of all African-American students in higher education. In 1995, HBCUs enrolled 26 percent of all African-American students in four-year colleges, awarded masters degrees and first-professional degrees to approximately one in six African-American men and women, and awarded 27 percent of all baccalaureate degrees earned by African-Americans nationwide.

You have appointed several HBCU graduates to serve in your administration. Secretary Rod Paige is a graduate of Jackson State University and Ambassador Leonard Spearman, Executive Director of the HBCU White House Initiative, is a graduate of Florida A&M University.

TALKING POINTS

- I am committed to ensuring that all students receive a quality education. The No Child Left Behind Act that I signed earlier this year ensures that schools are held accountable for educating every child and requires States to focus their resources on closing the achievement gap.
- Every child in America deserves a quality teacher. Unfortunately, studies have continued to show that minority and low-income children are significantly less likely to be taught by a highly-qualified teacher. They are twice as likely as the average child to be taught by uncertified or inexperienced teachers.
- Our teaching colleges should play a significant role in improving teacher quality. HBCUs, as the training ground for a significant number of future teachers, can become models of excellence in ensuring that new teachers are trained in the areas in which they will teach. A few colleges across the Nation have taken the teacher quality problem into their own hands by recruiting their best students into teacher preparation programs. I encourage you to join them and lead our institutions of higher education in developing excellent teacher preparation programs.
- In 2002, Title I funding was increased by \$1.6 billion, or 18 percent, and I have requested an additional \$1 billion in funding for 2003.
- In addition, I am committed to ensuring that every child can read by the third grade. That is why I support putting \$5 billion over 5 years into the Reading First program. In 2002, Reading First received almost \$1 billion for its first year of the program, and 9 states have already received grants and begun implementing research-based reading programs.
- A quality education does not end in elementary or high school, though. Next year, we will be considering the reauthorization of the Higher Education Act, which will give us the chance to address the issues of accessibility, accountability, and affordability of higher education. It will also give us a chance to show our support for important higher education programs of particular interest to you, including programs supporting HBCUs.
- I have pledged to increase funding for HBCUs, Historically Black Graduate Institutions (HBGIs), and Hispanic-Serving Institutions (HSIs) by 30 percent between 2001 and 2005.
- In Fiscal Year 2001, HBCUs received \$230 million, and that funding increased to \$255 million in 2002. I have asked for \$264.2 million in funding for these programs benefiting HBCUs in 2003, which would get to the halfway point of fulfilling my goal of a 30 percent increase over four years.
- I appreciate your leadership in continuing to support these invaluable institutions, which serve almost 300,000 African-Americans across the country. You have helped to turn out two people I am proud to work with, Secretary Rod Paige and Ambassador Spearman. This demonstrates your passion and dedication towards educating our Nation's leaders, and I will continue to work with you on this mission.

A PROCLAMATION

America's Historically Black Colleges and Universities are a vital part of our Nation's higher education system. During National Historically Black Colleges and Universities Week, we renew our dedication to these institutions and strengthen our commitment to securing educational freedom, opportunity, and access for every American.

Emerging more than a century ago in a segregated society, our Historically Black Colleges and Universities have provided quality education and promoted greater participation by African Americans in every sector of our society. These institutions continue to serve as centers of hope and opportunity, reflecting the belief that every student in America should have access to a college education. While constituting less than 3 percent of America's institutions of higher education, today they enroll 14 percent of all African Americans enrolled in colleges or universities.

These schools represent a source of accomplishment and great pride for both the African-American community and our entire Nation. The various founders of our Historically Black

Colleges and Universities understood that high standards and quality instruction would prepare their students to follow their dreams and succeed in life. By opening doors to new academic pursuits, these schools have encouraged and enabled generations of African Americans to reach their full potential.

America must continue to support these important institutions, because they provide educational opportunities that otherwise might not be available. In 1980, Executive Order 12232 established a Federal program to enhance equal opportunity and strengthen the capacity of Historically Black Colleges and Universities to provide excellence in education. My Administration remains committed to this important mission and to making the goal of higher education accessible to our citizens.

America recognizes and honors the many achievements of Historically Black Colleges and Universities, and their invaluable contributions to our country. They help foster a culture of achievement and create a brighter future for all Americans.

NOW, THEREFORE, I, GEORGE W. BUSH, President of the United States of America, by virtue of the authority vested in me by the Constitution and laws of the United States, do hereby proclaim September 15 through September 21, 2002, as National Historically Black Colleges and Universities Week. I call upon

public officials, educators, librarians, and citizens of the United States to observe this week with appropriate ceremonies, activities, and programs in order to show our appreciation for these remarkable educational institutions, and to commend the achievements of their talented graduates.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, I have hereunto set my hand this thirteenth day of September, in the year of our Lord two thousand two, and of the Independence of the United States of America the two hundred and twenty-seventh.

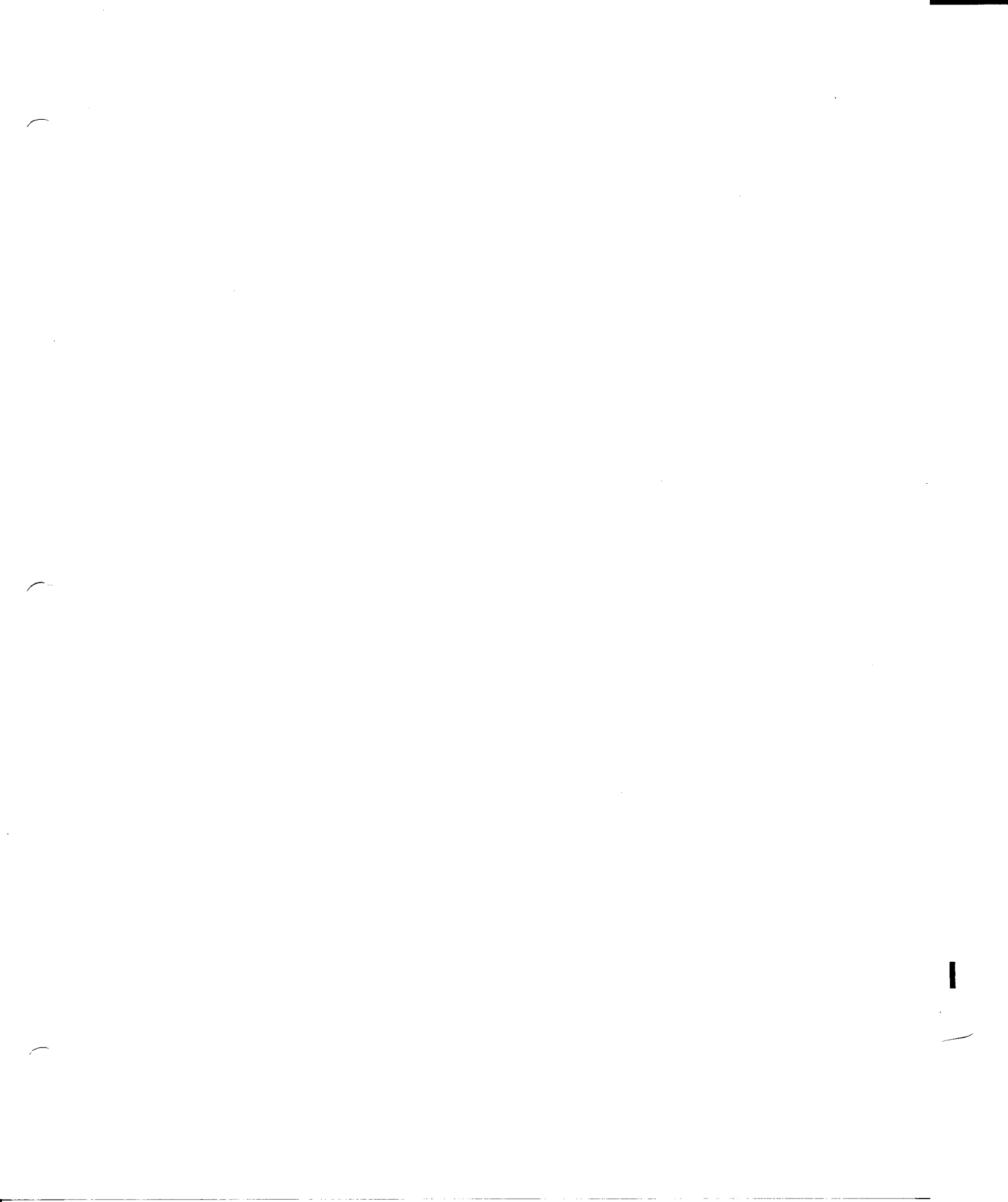
